As well as improving quality of life, confidence and self-esteem, therapeutic eco-therapy can help develop positive mental health through connecting with others while helping develop and tend the allotments. Dorchester Lions made a donation of £600 towards this project, helping fund a poly-tunnel where fruit and vegetables can be grown regardless of the wonderful British weather.

Community Service Awards

Dorchester Lions attach importance to every area of their local community, acknowledging the achievements and the dedication of both young and old. Since 2008 they have awarded prizes for Community Service to students from the Thomas Hardye School, Dorchester Middle School, St Osmunds Middle School, and St Mary's Middle School in Puddletown. These awards are for students who, in the opinion of teaching staff and fellow students, have made a significant contribution to their community. Each award comprises a trophy, which the student holds for a year, and a gift token. Trophies are engraved with the winners name and returned to the school trophy cabinet each year.

At the Thomas Hardye School, there is also an annual award made in memory of Mike Lillington, a past President of Dorchester Lions, for a student makes good progress in a practical way rather than academically. It is important that every skill is recognised for its contribution to society, and this monetary award is given for the purchase of tools or other relevant equipment.

Dorchester Lions: Serving the Community The Plugster

So, what is a Plugster? A Plugster is a simple invention you can wrap around a plug to make it easier to remove from its socket, a great help to the many who find moulded plugs especially, a real problem. It has been utilised by various Councils to promote energy efficiency, using it to label appliances that can be unplugged safely. But maybe more importantly, Fall Prevention teams also promote the use of the Plugster, discovering that it helps reduce the number of falls involving the elderly. The balance of an elderly person is affected when gripping and pulling a plug. If their grip fails, the resulting fall may have serious consequences. This device has been backed by organisations such as the fire brigade, the police, the NHS, housing associations, Athritis Care and Age UK to name but a few. Dorchester Lions help many people, including the elderly and the disabled, so it comes as no surprise that this is an initiative they are keen to put their weight behind. Message in a Bottle...

Message in a Bottle, a simple idea designed to incorporate your personal and medical details on one form and in one location - the fridge. Should the emergency services be called to your home, they will be able to locate your Bottle. How will they know you have one? Two labels will be on display, one on the inside of your front door or main entrance to your home, the second on the door of your fridge. One of the great things about this scheme is that it is completely free to the user. And although the focus may be on the most vulnerable people in our community, anyone can fall downstairs or suffer a stroke or heart attack. Message



in a Bottle saves the emergency services valuable time, all your details and those of your contacts being readily available. Special medication, allergies, pacemakers ... the form contained in this Bottle is a

potential lifesaver. If you have problems locating Message in a Bottle, contact your local Lions Club. They will be only too pleased to help – and it could save your life or that of a family member.

Presentation to YOU Trust



It is believed almost 700 million people across the globe suffer from blindness or impaired vision that is completely avoidable and could be easily helped with a pair of glasses. A high percentage of these people are living with "functional blindness", poor eyesight creating problems with basic everyday tasks such as reading, writing, cooking and entering the workplace. Dorchester Lions collect used spectacles and eyeglasses from opticians and clinics across the town.

Transported to sorting and grading depots, they are sent overseas for use by those who do not have access to the optical healthcare facilities we enjoy in this country. This Sight for All campaign is so important and one we can easily contribute to by donating our old glasses. Just one pair could give a person a healthy, independent life, a child doing better in school or an adult improving his chances of employment. Everyday tasks could be better accomplished. And all with the help of a pair of recycled glasses.
