The charities and organisations that Dorchester and District Lions support are many and varied. A donation of £250.00 was made to Longmead Summer Camp. Held at Longmead Community Farm, and forming part of Summer in Dorset, this provides enriching and fun activities for children and young people of different ages, needs and abilities. Partaking of life outdoors, they learn about healthy eating, healthy living, and the countryside around them.



Activities on hand include horticulture, woodland skills, and animal care. Trained professionals are in attendance to lead the activities, and 1-1 support is available for children who would otherwise be unable to access such events. Many of the places at Summer Camp are free to those in receipt

of free school meals, **Longmead Community Farm** being an approved provider for Dorset
Council's Summer in Dorset programme.
This programme brings outdoor fun and
nutritious food to children eligible for
benefit-related free school meals during the
summer holidays. The range of activities
offered and their inclusion policy means
additional funds are always very welcome.

**Keep 106** is the community radio station for Dorchester and the surrounding towns and villages, and operates on a not-for-profit basis. The station broadcasts 24 hours a day and is run by a group of enthusiastic volunteers with a wealth of broadcasting experience. Providing an important link between local organisations and the general public, donations towards the running costs are always welcome, ensuring the station can continue its free service to the community. Up pop Dorchester Lions with **£200** to boost their bank balance.

£250 made its way to the mental health charity **Dorset Mind**, supporting their work with the under-25 age group. This has been difficult times for many suffering from poor mental health, and every penny from this generous donation will go towards relieving the problems faced by many of our young people, both over the last twelve months and in the months to come.

Carl Dallison said: "It is fantastic that Dorchester Lions donated some trees to plant in Salisbury Fields. The trees are native species such as lime, willow and field maple, and will, over time, replace the large existing mature trees that are such a key feature in the landscape of this open space. An added benefit will be the increased opportunity for wildlife to use the trees for food and shelter, thus helping to increase the biodiversity in Dorchester."
